


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Moon Called (Patricia Briggs' Mercy Thompson)

Some of the characters overlap and events in one play into the other. I learned this from that other reader I mentioned earlier. I may have ignored this series for a little while longer until I noticed Laura at Little Read Riding Hood plowing through both series one book after another. When she is that caught up

in a series, I pay attention.;)

I can see why a lot of people seem to love these books but I can't get into the authors style. There's too much information packed into too small of a space. Paragraphs and paragraphs of complicated werewolf lore and explanations during what should be action scenes; too many characters introduced too quickly with more paragraphs of information; too much back story shoved too quickly into the mix, far too many complex relationship issues and explanations of past events...culminating in the author interjecting an explanation of what happened several hours earlier during what could have been an amusing and fun scene if she hadn't wasted pages telling us what occurred 3 hours earlier. This causes a lot of confusion and breaks in stride of the protagonists "voice" and the action. A good editor was sorely needed in this case. About 2/3rds of the book could have been cut (perhaps used in later installments) and made this a great read rather than a mediocre one, tedious one. A little mystery goes a long way in this case. We didn't need to know every tiny detail and every emotion of the main character and the reasons for her estrangement from her werewolf family. Are you tired of my constantly explaining why this book irritated me? Probably as tired as I got of the authors constant ramblings.

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
