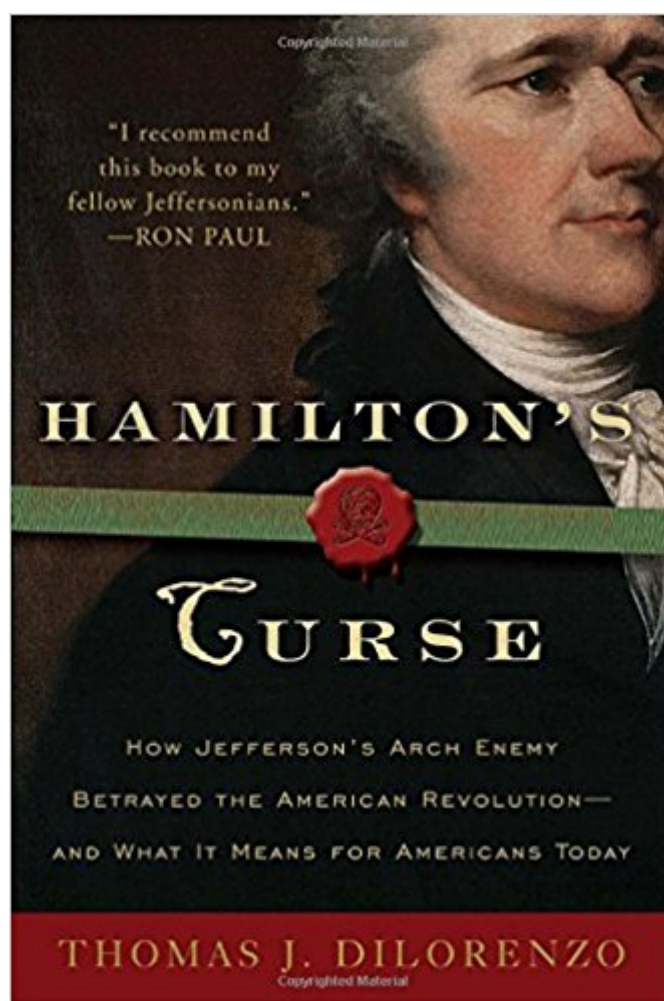

Carried on through his political heirs, the Hamiltonian legacy: Wrested control into the hands of the federal government by inventing the myth of the Constitution's "implied powers" Established the imperial presidency (Hamilton himself proposed a permanent president in other words, a king) Devised a national banking system that imposes boom-and-bust cycles on the American economy Saddled Americans with a massive national debt and oppressive taxation Inflated the role of the federal courts in order to eviscerate individual liberties and state sovereignty Pushed economic policies that lined the pockets of the wealthy and created a government system built on graft, spoils, and patronage Transformed state governments from Jeffersonian bulwarks of liberty to beggars for federal crumbs By debunking the Hamiltonian myths perpetuated in recent admiring biographies, DiLorenzo exposes an uncomfortable truth: The American people are no longer the masters of their government but its servants.
