As you may have guessed I was enchanted by this book. I loved that each of the twelve sisters had their own personality and their own strengths and weaknesses. The girls handled the death of their mother in a believable way, and held everything together in the castle (although I am not sure what exactly they fed the newborn baby after their mother died?), I could relate to their feelings about their father being very emotionally and physically distant from them for most of the book,I felt very sorry for the girls for having to call their father ' King'. Keeper quite frankly gave me goose bumps because I could tell from the start that he was using the girls and because the girls were not able to see it yet. A few times I almost screamed at Azalea not to go back!!! I appreciated the fact that Azalea, as the main heroine of this book was very strong and tough. The climax and ending were amazing and I feel could possibly be the definition of a 'Happy ending' I was a bit annoyed by the obsession over the "sugar teeth" but it was also funny at times. Entwined does move a bit slow at the beginning but keep reading, it's worth it!!! On another note their is absolutely no sex, drugs, alcohol or bad language in this book, it is an extremely clean read. If you read Entwined you won't regret it, I am sure you will be as enchanted by it as I was.

I am a huge fan of fairy tales. My laptop even bears the name of one of Sleeping Beauty's fairy godmothers, Merryweather. So it should come as no surprise that I fell head over heels in love with this modern-told fairytale that so beautifully combined bits of the Victorian era and a contemporary love of adventure and quickly-paced story with all the awe and sweetness and language of classic fairy tales. Her style reminds me very much of those princess stories we all know and love. I can't even think of how to describe her style. A combination of Swan Lake and The Nutcracker, perhaps?If you are a fan of fairy tales, you should put Entwined on your to-read list. You'll love this retelling of the twelve dancing princesses. The Keeper is just sinister and if I were her I'd never go back. The romance in Entwined is what I love best! Captain Bradford is such a delightful book boyfriend, as are the matches for Bramble and Clover (no spoilers!)I love the world Dixon created and I found myself falling deeper and deeper into Azalea's kingdom with each word I read. Dixon's writing is impeccable and there were many hilarious moments! I loved how all the characters were well-developed. The father-daughter(s) relationship between the King and his daughters was amazingly written and I started to like the King even though I'd hated him in the beginning like Azalea. Also, I love how he's so protective of the girls and gets into fights with suitors more than often. It's just simply hilarious!This is one of my favourite retellings of The Twelve Dancing Princesses and I strongly encourage you to pick this up.
