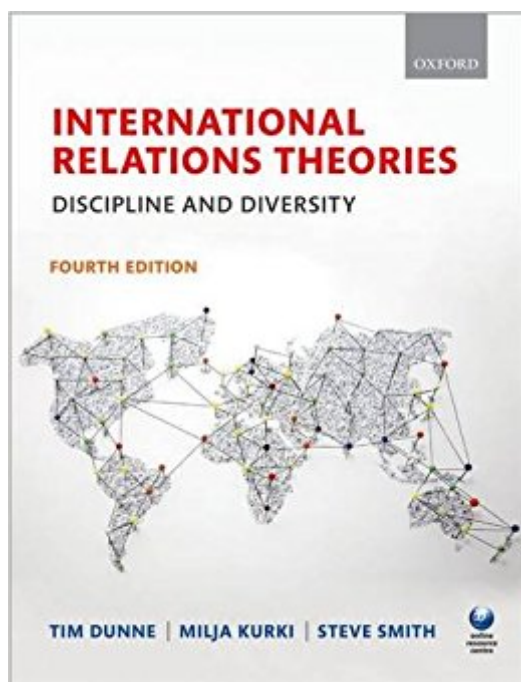

The various families of theories are covered, pretty clearly by those who support those theories, although there is no acerbic tone to the chapters, and they seem to have been coordinated enough that they address the basic concern of the book. Enough detail for an thorough introduction to someone who is unaware of these diverging opinions in international relations, with references for further reading for those who want more, new terms are generally explained before they are used, with the interesting exception of "Fordism."
