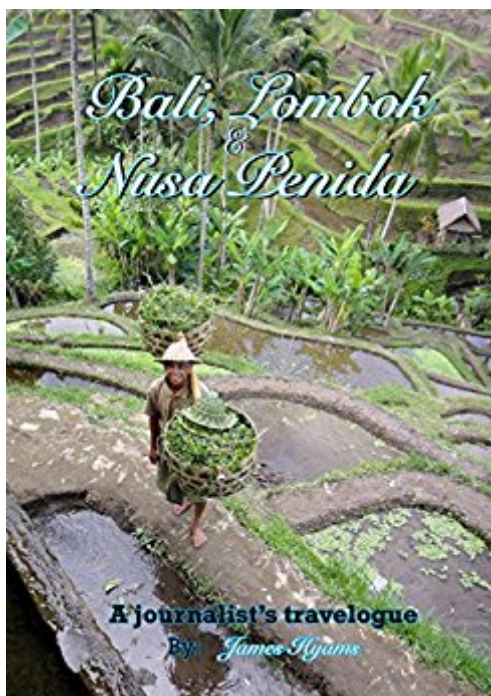


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# Bali, Nusa Penida, & Lombok: A Journalist's Travelogue



## Synopsis

Bali, Lombok and Nusa Pineda were sold to us as the penultimate paradise. Our colleagues shared stories of beautiful beaches, great shopping, wonderful hotels, a fun environment, and a place to find peace. We researched our journey for several weeks using the Lonely Planet guidebook, online blogs, photos and video on Google maps and YouTube. This research was therapeutic as it took my mind away from a stressful and unhappy work environment. Like most people choosing a holiday destination, we focused on finding the paradise that was missing from our stressful lives. What we found during our travel in and around Bali was nothing short of amazing. There was systematic chaos in the Kuta area, wonderful locals trying to make a few dollars from tourism, corrupt police, heart wrenching stories, a beautiful landscape, some world class hotels, a battle between tourism development and traditional cultural practices, magnificent wealth, poor business acumen on the street, plenty of drugs, a slightly hidden sex industry, and abject poverty. It became apparent that the ethnocentrism and purchasing power of many tourists (us included) strongly destroyed the traditional Balinese life and culture. In this travelogue we document our journey, talk with locals and hear their stories, review cities, beaches, hotels, restaurants, ships, planes, and travel systems along the way. We will share some of our story, photos and experiences from the trip. If you intend to travel to Bali or Lombok then you should read this book to get a realistic understanding of what to expect.
