


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# The Book Of GIMP: A Complete Guide To Nearly Everything

If you use GIMP, this will help you get the most out of it. The directions are pretty clear. My only gripe is sometimes you have to hunt to solve some of the more obscure problems that are really quirks of GIMP and nothing to do with this book (i.e., GIMP has boxes that close and you can't figure out how to re-open them, or other strange little quirks that are beginner-frustrating). It's not the books fault GIMP does this, but I wish they'd mentioned that when you go to enlarge or erase things there are quirky things that will leave you ripping out your hair when your mouse suddenly stops working.

I'm computer savvy, been using them since apple ][ and before. Been using Linux exclusively for ten years(debian, if anyone cares)However, I am seriously deficient in any photo manipulation knowledge. I bought this book hoping it would 'teach me the basics' as it claims, however it only skims over basics assuming a level of knowledge that is beyond me. I found it completely useless as a learning tool. I was unable to figure out from this book how to do simple things like manually crop a photo, let alone understand layers. it touches on concepts but assumes a much higher level of knowledge(of photo manipulation in general) then it claims. As a previous reviewer said, the 'tutorials' without the specific photos used are pretty much useless as a learning tool. Hopefully in a

few years, when I've learned how to manipulate photos in general, I can use this as a reference, but for now it's a doorstop. I read technical history and textual criticism books on a regular basis, so I do not think it's a lack of reading comprehension.

I bought this book to use GIMP to tidy up my photographs. This book helped me achieve that goal. The first half of the book is chock-full of step by step tutorials to perform many common photo manipulation and other graphics tasks. I was able to learn everything by following along as the authors described the steps. Keep in mind, this is a \_doing\_ book. You need to repeat the steps as they describe it for true learning to occur. It would also help if you consider the tutorials to be a starting point, and then practice the tools by yourself, perhaps with some additional Googling.I did not like the ebook version of this book. The changes to some pictures are subtle and difficult to notice on an e-reader. There are a lot of picture references that are difficult to flip to and comprehend on an iPad or Kindle. You will do much better with the paper book. A nice touch is that the paper book is printed on quality paper, and is saddle stitched!

Although I have only begun to explore this volume it is certainly comprehensive. I am a PC novice and find that many of the directions are still too vague for me, and make the assumption that I understand the "computerese" in which they are speaking. This fault is both mine and the books. I perhaps need, "Gimp for Dummies." That being said, I shall persevere and simply keep at it. I am not at all sorry to have bought it.

This book is ok, but...the authors don't go in enough detail and leaves me hanging so I have to play around -trial and error- to accomplish what I want....I would not buy this book if you want something to teach you Gimp. I would have done just as well on my own and using the free notes on the Gimp website....save your money....

I took a class on GIMP at my college. It didn't require any text book, but I wanted a good resource anyway. Of all the books I researched on GIMP, this one comes the closest to being like a text that you'd use in a college course. It's comprehensive, but also systematic. The best book on the subject I know of.

There are plenty of books written about how to use Photoshop. Very few on how to use the Open Source Equivalent GIMP. The BOOK Of GIMP is VERY thorough in going into all possible usages of

the program. It's is currently up to date with the latest version 2.48 It is easy to understand if you follow the flow of the book, as it gradually guides you through all the possible usages and options available to you. If you understand how powerful this program is, you will obviously understand that only familiarity with usage will make you a proficient user of GIMPIt is written and edited by some of the major writers of this open source program, so they really know the in's and out's of this program, and, subsequently, know how to get the most out of it. This book is as Technical as needs to be for those who just want to USE the program, without wanting to write code to help improve it. It is well indexed [a HUGE plus when searching] and includes references to additional PLUG-IN's and GIMP Specific sites and Forums. All in All, if you are after a definative book on GIMP, that is up to date [June 2013] and it's usage, well this is definitely the one to get. Highly recommended.

I have not had much time to spend with the book, but look over it briefly, it seems very comprehensive. What I WOULD like, that would move it to 5 stars, is if when you buy the hard-copy, you automatically get the kindle version too. Seems I have seen this option on other books before, and thought I might find it here, but it does not seem to be an option.

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
