

What is autism? Can't quite explain it? Read this book. It's told from the first-person POV of a young girl with Aspergers. Her family and the community are trying to heal from a tragic school shooting. The protag lost her older brother. She watches as others (especially her father) struggle with their emotions while trying to explain her own, but of course, she processes differently than others. Along the way she forms relationships with two other children affected: one whose mother was killed and the cousin of the perpetrator. The three of them band together and grow. This is not only a great story about friendship and healing, but also does a great job explaining how people with ASD view the world. This is such a good book that I use it in my high school class, despite it being more appropriate for middle school readers.

Unbelievable book. I honestly cannot even describe how much I loved this book. Erskine has an remarkable understanding of the mind of a child with Asperger's Syndrome. The writing, the dialogue; it's as if you are quite literally in the head of the narrator. To describe this book as an emotional roller-coaster may sound cliched, but is most entirely accurate. Reading this book, whether in public or in private, I laughed, cried and found myself in a confused state where I wasn't even sure what to feel. This book convey's an unbelievable story of transformation in a way that is so human, any one can relate and empathize with the nearly deceptively dynamic protagonist. I felt like I would never be able to put it down.

What a powerful book! Ms. Erskine tackles tough topics and presents them appropriately for middle grade students. I would use this in a middle grade classroom for teaching empathy, and for teaching voice. Ms. Erskine never slipped in her character's Asberger voice.

I found it heart warming and loving and kind. It was funny at times, yet I never felt that I was laughing at Caitlin, but chuckling at the way people cannot understand her heart and mind...all the while she is working so hard at "getting it" to understand theirs. I wish I had a window into the mind of how my child's thoughts process, as she's had a learning, processing disability all her life, and she's done really well, but I often wished I really could hear her thoughts when i was struggling to have her understand the point I was trying to make. This helps me a lot. I think this is a good ready for anyone who works with or lives with or goes to school with and loves someone with any kind of difference.

It is a very well written story. It does a great of seeing the world thru the eyes of child on the Autism spectrum.
