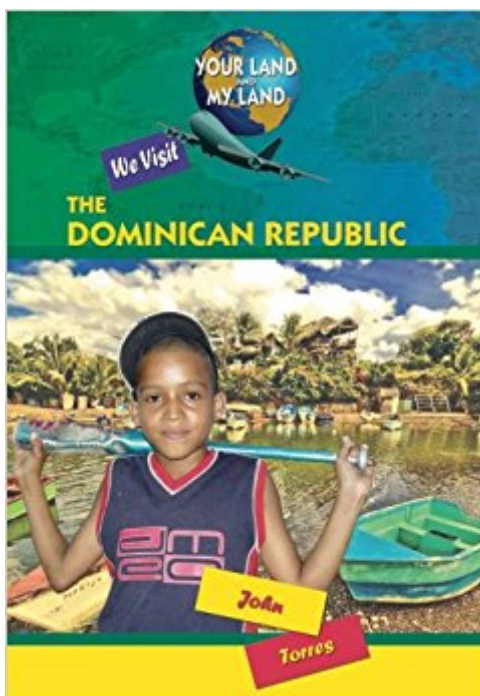


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We Visit The Dominican Republic (Your Land And My Land)

Gr 5-7—These volumes may be brimming with information, but they are also riddled with problems. Chile is the best of the lot. Orr's writing style is clean and appropriately mature for the level of the text. Puerto Rico and Dominican Republic are written like bad junior-high essays, sprinkled with exclamation marks and ineffectual rhetorical questions using the second-person perspective. Tracy's book is packed with a mishmash of facts about Cuba. The contents of the chapters overlap, making for a real organizational disaster. The writing is choppy, with few

transitions to bridge different topics. There's no conclusion; the text abruptly stops after the last paragraph, which is about Havana rather than a summary statement about the country. These books are a missed opportunity; they contain a respectable amount of material for reports, but the presentations are off-putting.
